

JUROR INFORMATION

PLEASE NOTE THE FOLLOWING INFORMATION AS IT IS RELEVANT TO YOUR JURY SERVICE:

- I. Directions to the Courthouse**
The Courthouse is located downtown Marion, Indiana on the Square at 101 E 4th St. Circuit Court is located on the 2nd floor.
- II. Parking**
Parking for jurors is available around the Courthouse Square and along side streets.
- III. Public Transportation**
There is public transportation available in Marion. Taxi service also is available.
- IV. Compensation**
Grant County provides compensation for jurors for their service. Currently the rate for jury service is \$15.00 per day as a prospective juror, and if you are selected the rate of compensation is \$40.00 per day. Mileage is paid.
- V. Attire**
Dress appropriately for being in a Courtroom. Business attire is appropriate, as is casual business attire. Do not report in wearing hats, tank tops, and shorts or any attire, which is inappropriate for the Courtroom.
- VI. Meals**
Meals are normally not provided, except during deliberations.
- VII. Cell Phones**
Cell phones are not permitted in the Courthouse. Please leave them at home or in your vehicle.
- VIII. Jury Term**
The length of your service will be one day or, if selected to a jury, until that trial concludes. The Court is normally in session from 8:30 a.m. until noon and from 1:15 p.m. until 5:00 p.m. Occasionally these times will vary.
- IX. Security**
When you arrive enter the Courthouse from the south end ground level. You will be required to pass through a metal detector, so please leave weapons, knives, sharp objects and pepper sprays at home or in your car. Also, please turn off pagers.
- X. Introduction to the Case**
Once the prospective jurors are seated, the Judge will provide you with an introduction of the proceedings. You will be:
 - Introduced to the participants
 - Informed as to the nature of the case
 - Informed as to the applicable standard or burden of proof
 - Informed as to the presumption of innocence in a criminal case
 - Informed as to the appropriate means by which jurors may address their private concerns
 - Informed as to the appropriate standard of juror conduct
 - Informed as to the anticipated course of the proceedings
 - Informed as to the rules regarding challenges to prospective jurors
 - Informed as to the number of jurors that will be selected for the particular case
 - Informed as to the anticipated length of the proceedings
